- **Connect with Nature.** Spending time outdoors improves wellbeing and fosters a sense of calm.




• Discover Community History. The trails connect to landmarks and stories that celebrate the history of North Brentwood and surrounding areas.

Be Proud of North Brentwood!

This is a friendly reminder about the need to adhere to Town's parking and vehicle compliance regulations. To maintain community safety, accessibility, and appearance, these policies are strictly enforced:

- **Expired Tags.** Vehicles with expired registration tags are subject to towing.
- Abandoned Vehicles. North Brentwood is not a storage area for cars, trucks, or other vehicles.

If your vehicle is towed, the associated costs are:

- Towing Fee. \$215.
- **Storage Fee.** \$50 for the first 18 hours and an additional \$50 for every 24 hours thereafter.

Please avoid unnecessary inconvenience and expense by ensuring your vehicle registration is current and your parking complies with Town regulations.

Thank you for your cooperation in helping us keep North Brentwood a safe, clean, and welcoming community for all. If you have questions or concerns, please feel free to contact our Code Enforcement Office.

Your Voice, Your Future:

PG County Executive Special Election March 4

If you haven't heard, Prince George's County is gearing up for an important election season, with the County Executive race taking center stage. The County Executive plays a critical role shaping policies and priorities that directly impact our schools, public safety, transportation, and economic development.

What Does the County Executive Do?

The County Executive is the county's chief executive officer: implementing local laws, managing county government operations, and crafting a budget that reflects our communities' needs. Their decisions affect everything from funding for local programs to long-term planning for growth and sustainability.

Why This Election Matters

The County Executive election influences the direction of Prince George's county for the next four years. Issues such as affordable housing, public transit improvements, education funding, and economic development are expected to be hot topics during the upcoming election campaign.

How to Get Involved

- Register to Vote: Ensure you're registered to vote; check your status at the Maryland State Board of Elections site: voterservices.elections.maryland.gov /VoterSearch.
- Meet the Candidates: Attend forums, town halls, and debates to learn where candidates stand on issues that matter most to you: elections.maryland. gov/elections/2025/SP_Primary_Candidate/ gen_cand_lists_2025_1_by_county_ALL.html.

Vote Early or on Election Day

- Early voting: (Feb 26 to March 3, 2025) will be held at select county sites, 10 am to 8 pm Wednesday through Saturday (and the Monday before Election Day), and from 12 pm to 6pm on Sunday.
- Ballot dropbox locations, and availability, are TBD.



 Of course, you can cate your vote on Election Day, Tuesday, March 4, from 7 am top 8pm. Consider voting by mail if it's more convenient for you.

Local elections are your chance to shape the future of Prince George's County. Let's work together to ensure North Brentwood's residents are informed, engaged, and ready to cast their ballots.

Pepco's Winter Storm Preparedness: Stay Safe and Informed

As temperatures drop and winter storms loom, preparedness is more than just a precaution—it's a responsibility. Together, we can ensure we're ready for whatever winter throws our way.

Steps to Prepare for Winter Storms

Preparation is key to minimize disruptions/stay safe:

- Make an Emergency Storm Kit. Stock up on bottled water, non-perishable food, flashlights, batteries, medications, a first-aid kit, blankets and warm clothing in case of power outages.
- Create a Winter Storm Plan. Have a clear plan for your household in the event of an outage/severe storm. Identify a safe, warm location to wait it out. Keep important contact numbers handy.
- Stay Connected. Confirm your current phone number in the "My Alerts and Notifications" section of pepco.com/myaccount, to receive critical updates during emergencies. Download pepco.com/mobileapp, to access real-time info.
- Access Additional Resources. Visit pepco.com/ stormprep for tips, resources, and safety info.

Pathway to Purchase Mortgage Program


In October, the Department of Housing and Community Development, and the Redevelopment Authority, worked with the State to launch the MD Mortgage Program's Pathway to Purchase: the county's First-Time Homebuyer Assistance Program. The partnership increased benefits for homebuyers and makes it easier to buy a first home:

- Pathway to Purchase now offers up to \$25,000 in down payment and closing cost assistance.
- The program still provides a zero percent deferred loan, which is forgiven after 10 years.
- Homebuyers no longer need 1.75 percent of the purchase price in cash for the down payment.

Homestead Property Tax Credit

To help homeowners deal with large assessment increases on principal residences, state law established the Homestead Property Tax Credit. The Credit limits the increase in taxable assessments each year to a fixed percentage, which, in North Brentwood, is 10 percent.

- ALL Maryland homeowners must submit a *one-time*application to establish eligibility for the credit: only *once*during your time in your property.
- The Homestead Credit does not limit the market value of a property determined by Department of Assessments and Taxation. Instead, it's a credit calculated on assessment increases exceeding 10% from one year to the next.
- Before calling or emailing the Department, please check SDAT's Real Property search page to determine if you already have a Homestead Tax Credit on file. Find the status of your eligibility by looking up your property on: sdat.dat.maryland.gov/RealProperty.

Once you've accessed your property's page, the status of your Homestead application is located at the bottom of the page. A status of "Approved" or "Application Received" means no further action is required.

- If the status of your property says "Homestead Application Status: No Application," you must file an application.
 - File online. For fast service, go to Maryland One Stop, a portal for state agencies with one simple login, and no need for an access code to fill out a one-time form. Go to: onestop.md.gov and browse by State Agencies. Then, select Department of Assessments & Taxation and click on "Homestead Tax Credit Eligibility Application."
 - Paper application. Alternatively, you can complete and submit the paper application on pages 11 and 12 of this newsletter. Or, go to: dat.maryland.gov/SDAT%
 20Forms/Homestead_application.pdf to download it. Fax completed paper applications to 410.225.9344, or mail to: Department of Assessments and Taxation, Homestead Tax Credit Division, 700 East Pratt Street, 2nd Floor, Suite 2700, Baltimore, Maryland 21202.

Tax Season is Here: What Maryland Residents Need to Know

As a new year begins, so does tax season—a time to get financial documents in order and prepare to file income taxes. For Maryland residents, it's important to be aware of key deadlines, resources, and updates to ensure a smooth, stress-free tax filing process.

Key Deadlines

- Start of Filing Season: The IRS and the Maryland Comptroller's Office typically begin accepting tax returns in late January.
- Tax Filing Deadline: The deadline to file federal and Maryland state taxes is April 15, 2025. Be sure to file on time to avoid penalties.

Steps to Prepare for Tax Season

- Gather Your Documents: Collect all paperwork, e.g., W-2s, 1099s, interest income statements, and receipts for deductions and charitable donations.
- 2. Check for Maryland Tax Updates: Visit the state Comptroller's website for any changes to state tax laws or credits for this tax year.
- 3. Choose Your Filing Method: Maryland offers several ways to file your taxes:
 - Online. Use Maryland's free iFile system or commercial software.
 - By Mail. Submit paper tax returns to the address listed on your tax forms.
 - With Assistance. Consider hiring a tax pro or go to a Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) site.

Maryland Tax Credits and Deductions

Take advantage of state-specific tax credits and deductions, to maximize your refund/reduce liability:

- Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC): For eligible low- and moderate-income families.
- Homeowners' Tax Credit: Provides relief based on income and property taxes owed (see page eight).
- Student Loan Debt Relief Tax Credit: For qualifying Maryland residents with student loan debt.

Free Tax Preparation Resources

- VITA and TCE Programs: If your household income is \$60,000 or less, you may qualify for free tax prep services via Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) or Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) programs.
- CASH Campaign of MD: provides free tax prep for individuals/households making \$64,000 or less.
- Maryland Comptroller's Office: Access free filing options and resources at marylandtaxes.gov.

Tips for a Stress-free Tax Season

- **File Early:** Avoid the last-minute rush; filing taxes early also reduces the risk of identity theft.
- Double-Check for Accuracy: Ensure personal info (such as Social Security numbers and banking details) is correct before submitting your return.
- Plan for Payment: If you owe taxes, consider setting up a payment plan through the Comptroller's Office.
